Who Qualifies - And Who Leaves Money on the Table?

System installed in U.S. territory

Ownership (leases/power agreements excluded)

New equipment meeting fire/safety codes

The Tax Liability Catch Most Miss

Can you claim the full credit if your tax bill is low? Absolutely. Unused credits roll over for up to 5 years. If you owe \$5,000 annually and receive a \$9,000 credit:

Year 1: \$5,000 deduction



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Year 2: \$4,000 remaining credit

Year 3: Full deduction completed

3 Critical Questions Homeowners Forget to Ask

Q: Does the credit cover battery storage?

A: Yes! The 2023 update includes solar-plus-storage systems with ≥ 3 kWh capacity.

Q: Can I combine this with utility rebates?

A: Most states allow stacking incentives. Texas homeowners often combine federal credits with Oncor's \$2,500 battery rebate.

Q: How does this affect my property taxes?

A: While 36 states offer solar property tax exemptions, the federal credit doesn't count as taxable income.

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
