1. What's the most overlooked item in solar contracts?

Monitoring system access - 41% of contracts don't specify whether customers receive real-time production data.

3. How specific should equipment warranties be?

Require separate warranties for panels (25 years), inverters (10-12 years), and labor (5-10 years) with transfer conditions.

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
